#### **CHURCH AVENUE**

Our church avenue offers a most beautiful setting to enjoy the seasons including, of course, its present autumnal scene. According to the late Mrs Marjorie Halligan's Parish History of St Mark's, trees were first planted on our church avenue 200 years ago, during 1821, ten years following the building of our church. It seems that the original trees were replanted, therefore some further research is required to establish from when the current lime trees originate.

Interestingly Mrs Halligan's book refers to an entry of the Parish Magazine of 1942 when a parishioner took a photograph of the avenue in spring and had some prints made, which were enlarged and coloured and sent to family members serving abroad to remind them of home. Whether during war, pandemic, or any other experience of life, our church avenue's comforting seasonal display reminds us of the faithfulness of God and the privilege that we have as his people to gather in his name to worship him. #### Rector's Letter ....

Dear Friends,

On Thursday 21st October, a special service took place in St Patrick's Cathedral here in Armagh entitled a 'Service of Reflection and Hope'. If you haven't already seen it, I would encourage you to watch it on BBC



iPlayer. I would like to thank some of our Parishioners who very willingly got up early to meet in the Shambles Yard to facilitate the welcoming and registering guests prior to the service. The Archbishop, Church Leaders, Dean, choir and all involved are to be commended for a service that beautifully lived up to its title.

What struck me about the service was how it involved very individual expressions of reflection and hope. Ιt was intergenerational and it was framed in personal perspectives. There were some lovely contributions from people of all generations with children and young people participating prominently. Primary school aged children, including some from our Parish, sang a song entitled 'We are the future of tomorrow', as part of an inter schools choir. Three secondary school aged young people shared their dreams for the future, two led prayers and led an act of commitment for peace, students read lessons and four children ushered a lantern in and out of the Cathedral symbolising the pursuit of peace to be sought by all. Older participants in the service included the Church leaders who offered very personal reflections based upon their own past experiences, the realities of the present, and aspirations for the future.

As I listened to the church leaders who grew up in Northern Ireland, I was very conscious that their youth was very different to that of the young people in the Cathedral at the same time. The youth of the young people today is set in a time of imperfect, but lasting peace. This is something to thank God for. Young people in our schools and colleges today are growing up in a Northern Ireland that has its problems, but is thankfully so different to that of generations that have gone before them.

This is a month when we remember lives lost in wars and in conflict here in our province. We remember those for whom the pursuit of peace and the upholding of justice came with the ultimate cost. It is right that we remember with gratitude and in sympathy for their loved ones. It is also right that we look forward with hope.

In the sermon and at various points, such as the stunningly beautiful singing of St Patrick's Breastplate by a soloist and members of the Cathedral Choir, St Patrick was referred to in the service. His was a love for his Lord and this island. His calling, at great personal cost, was to share the message of reconciliation between God and man. Peace with God and peace with one another. May we know that peace and be encouraged by the words of the Lord Jesus; "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God."

#### CHURCH SERVICES

During our October meeting, the Select Vestry approved some very minor amendments to what has become the norm for worship in St Mark's. We very much hope that everyone who participates in our services feels welcomed, reassured and know the presence of the Holy Spirit as we gather in worship of Almighty God.

Distancing has been reduced from over 2m to just under 2m. This has permitted a larger accommodation in our church building and therefore a larger proportion of worshippers to be seated downstairs in St Mark's and thereby benefitting from a better view.

Whether in the Crozier Hall or in St Mark's, worshippers are still required to wear face coverings (unless exempt) when entering and leaving the service, as well as whilst standing for hymn singing. It is recommended that face coverings are worn throughout the service to reduce the risk of Covid infection. Singers in the Choir Stalls are very well spaced and are permitted to remove face coverings to help lead us in our hymn singing.

# Curate's Corner....

What is your favourite story? Perhaps you have a favourite book or a favourite story you've read to your children and grandchildren. As a child my favourite book was 'Guess how much I love you?' by Sam McBratney. Every evening before bedtime that was the book my mum or dad read to me and I still remember the storyline twenty seven years later! Stories have a powerful impact. As words flow, they ignite our imagination and point to the very emotions that make us all human.

Recently I've been struck by many stories, not so much fictional but rather the stories of people's lives, what they've experienced, where they've been, what they're currently going through. During my deacon year, due to the pandemic I was unable to visit people in their homes. It has been a pleasure being able to visit people again (albeit on the doorstep due to restrictions) and listen to the stories of their lives. It is an utter privilege to listen to these stories, to share in their joy and hurt, in their celebration and their grief and to reveal God's presence throughout each story.

As Christians we are drawn to the Bible as our ultimate storybook, our guide for life. Perhaps you've seen gifts, notebooks, mugs and bookmarks with the scripture verse Jeremiah 29:11 inscribed on it. A verse which has been continually debated by commentators and scholars and it can seem cliché at points but regardless of who it was initially meant for it is true that God is the author of our story.

I know what I'm doing. I have it all planned out - plans to take care of you, not abandon you, plans to give you the future you hope for.

Jeremiah 29:11 (Message Translation)

As I reflect I've been encouraged to write my own story, I've noticed that although things didn't always go the way I expected, they worked out for the better because it was according to God's plan and not my own, according to his perfect timing and not mine.

So I encourage you to think about your life story, write it down, tell somebody who is willing to listen and discover how God has written every part of your story and how he continues to write it.

As part of our harvest celebrations we held our annual Ladies Harvest Breakfast in the Crozier hall on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> October. The early Saturday morning start was worth it as the smell of cooked breakfast and coffee from the kitchen travelled into the hall.



As Marks and Spencer would say, this wasn't just any breakfast - this was a fry up from the Charlemont Arms Hotel!

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank Helen from Charlemont for all her help in cooking, planning and making the event possible and Bob Brown and Mark Speers for being our waiters for the morning.

As stomachs began to get full and the top up of coffee continued, we were delighted to welcome Beth and Kate from Reach Mentoring as our guest speakers. Beth and Kate shared how Reach are working in local schools including The Royal School, City of Armagh High School and St Catherine's College to name a few. Recently Reach have been running sessions to support year 8 pupils who have made the transition from primary to secondary school. In addition, they visit schools on a weekly basis for one to one mentoring with pupils who are facing challenging situations and need extra support or someone to talk to.

We are delighted to have received £272 in donations from our harvest breakfast. This money will go towards helping Reach in their vital work in our community.


