Rector's Letter

Dear Friends,

What is the most frequently used App on your phone? One of my favourites is the Met Office App. Apart from at breakfast time, I don't often see the weather forecast on television, therefore having an App on my phone to see what the day's weather might involve is very convenient.



Knowing what the weather will involve during the hours, or even days, ahead is not only useful practically, but is also beneficial for the inevitable conversation point of the weather which will arise with the people that I meet!

Having the forecast for the arrival of Storm Isha was certainly advantageous. With the benefit of knowing that it was coming, we could be prepared. Perhaps for you, plans had to change and like us, you searched out the torches and filled a flask of hot water in case the electricity went out. With the frequency of named storms we can become quite ambivalent to their warnings. However, Storm Isha certainly packed the kind of punch that was anticipated and for PowerNI staff, as well as many of their customers, it created quite a challenge.

The benefit of a weather forecast gives some insight as to what is coming. However, life often includes the unanticipated. The experience of pastoral ministry is being with people often in times of unanticipated challenge.

Life's storms come, often without warning, and we are presented with changed realities and responses to make.

Whilst we cannot explain why life's circumstances change in the way that they do, we can be reassured from the Scriptures that we are not alone.

I love the story of Jesus walking on water in Matthew 14. His disciples were in a boat, terrified amidst a storm, and Jesus, whom the disciples left on the shore came to them walking on the lake. Terrified that he was a ghost, Jesus called out to the disciples; "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid." Whilst this was a specific reassurance for his fearful disciples on the lake, we too can take great comfort in knowing that we can call out to one who came to his disciples amidst the storm and enabled Peter, by faith to do the impossible. As Peter walked on water, he saw the wind and waves, his faith was overwhelmed and he sank. But hearing Peter's cry for help, Jesus rescued him and together in the boat they continued on their journey together. Amidst life's storms, our faith may wobble, but let us not abandon hope. Let us cry out to the Lord of mercy, who as we often say in our prayers of intercession in church, hears our prayer.

Please know that we are always willing to speak and pray with you, especially when in life's storms. May our faith in Jesus give us courage, strength and peace.

Curate's Corner....

Hi Everyone,

They say honesty is the best policy, right? It was just like any normal day I attended a morning meeting in Portadown and on the drive back to Armagh I thought I had 30 minutes to spare before my next engagement. Going through my to do list in my head I remembered it was my turn this week to get the groceries and considering we had no bread left in the cupboard, today would



have to be the day. Weighing up my options I thought '30 minutes is enough for a grocery shop right?' I was up for the challenge. With list in hand and shopping bags at the ready, I parked the car and headed to get a small trolley, as the wind was blowing a gale and the sky was lashing down with rain. I aimed to get inside quickly. As I approached the trolley park there was a lady standing with shopping bags asking passers by for £1 coin for her trolley in exchange for change. My brain went into autopilot on one hand I knew I had an extra £1 in my purse, however on the other hand I was in a rush, soaking wet and wanted to get the job done. so I did what In hindsight I shouldn't have done, and a walked passed her. As I entered the shop I didn't give it another thought until I saw her walking round the shop with a trolley and the guilt washed over me. I got my groceries, headed to the car and began to drive back to Armagh. As I was driving back I began playing the events over in my mind. I felt guilty. It would've only taken be a maximum of 20 seconds to help the lady and yet I felt like the Levite in the story of the Good Samaritan who walked by on the other side. I started praying as I drove for forgiveness and more awareness and action to help those in need.

Do you live with regrets? I have occasionally heard people say that they don't regret anything in their lives. In the 1969 song 'My Way' Frank Sinatra sings "Regrets, I've had a few. But then again, too few to mention" I'm not sure what he was getting at but I do know that regrets are a part of life. Some people say that they wouldn't be the people they are today without all the choices they've made and circumstances they've endured. But whilst I believe that it is true, that I wouldn't be who I am without my past, I also cannot bring myself to say that I have no regrets. Regret is synonymous with the recognition that God always has something better for our lives. When I look back on my past sins (the grocery store incident included), I look back with the understanding that God's way would have been the best way; I just didn't take heed of it at the time, and instead I choose my own way. Everyone has regrets of one kind or another. It usually involves feeling bad about something you wish you had done differently.

Scripture paints a two-sided picture of regret. Firstly, we read from the beginning to the end of the Bible of people who made mistakes, rebelled against God, sinned deliberately, leaving a legacy behind them, chose their own way instead of God's way. Secondly, we read the story of the amazing love which flows from the heart of God and His passionate desire to restore and forgive. These things are written for us, so that we will have endurance, hope and encouragement to press on and not give up.

In the book of Jeremiah there is a story of a man going down a narrow street to visit a pottery shop. There he saw a potter making clay pots on his pottery wheel. Jeremiah watched him casting the clay on the wheel, shaping it as he went. Then the clay split, and he stopped the wheel. But he doesn't throw the clay away in the bin as no good. He used it again, made it into a new lump, and started the wheel revolving once again, and another vessel took shape. No doubt many of the vessels on the shelf had been treated the same way—they probably all were made with spoiled clay. That day, Jeremiah saw spoiled clay being remade into beautiful vessels, and he got the picture. It tells us that God never throws us away when we make a mess of our lives. God just picks up the pieces and shapes them again on the wheel of life. And that includes our regrets. We are clay in the potter's hand, and in a marvellous way, God takes our brokenness, and moulds us into a worthwhile individual who can make a contribution to life as a child of God.

Are you living with a mountain of regret? Do you rehearse mistakes over and over? Pause today and repent over what is plaguing you with guilt and then let it go, receiving forgiveness!



REGISTER OF VESTRY MEMBERS

During the month of February, the Parish's General Register of Vestry Members is annually opened to allow for revision.

You may wonder what this is and why you might consider allowing your name to be included in this register?!

The General Register of Vestry Members includes a list of members of our Parish who have signed the necessary declaration and are therefore entitled to be nominated to serve, if they wish, on our Parish's Select Vestry. The Select Vestry is a committee of appointed representatives of our Parish who are responsible for managing our Parish Finances and maintaining or improving Parish properties.

Nominations to the Select Vestry are received at our General Vestry Meeting (or Easter Vestry Meeting) which is scheduled to take place on Tuesday 19th March (7.30pm) in the Crozier Hall. The General or Easter Vestry meeting is effectively an AGM and is therefore a public meeting which anyone can attend. However, if a vote is required at that meeting, only people who are listed in the General Register of Vestry Members can participate.

To be eligible to add your name in the General Register of Vestry Members, you must be 18 years or over, and have paid into our Parish Funds during 2023 in an identifiable way (eg. Parish Envelopes or Bank Transfer).

If you might be interested in becoming more involved in Parish Life during the year or years ahead, why not fill in a declaration? If you have registered in the past, you should not be required to be register again as you ought already to be listed in the Register. If you would like to enquire if you are already on the Register, please feel free to contact The Rector (37522970) who will gladly check for you. Declaration forms can be obtained from Church Wardens after services and completed forms ought to be returned to Caroline or to Church Wardens by Sunday, 25th February (11.45am) when a meeting of the Rector and Church Wardens will take place in the Church Vestry to revise the Register.





In recent months a review has taken place regarding our Mission Partnerships and we are very happy to share that our Parish has entered into two new opportunities facilitated by Church Mission Society Ireland (CMSI) and South American Mission Society Ireland (SAMS).

We are very thankful for our historic partnership with Shyogwe Diocese, Rwanda, during which we have supported numerous projects, hosted visitors from Rwanda and been involved in visits there also. Shyogwe is a vibrant Diocese and ours has been an established friendship. However, recent years has encouraged much reconsideration to take place and as an outcome of a recent public review meeting it was recommended to the Select Vestry that we grasp new opportunities for mission partnership going forward.

Rev'd Andrew and Mrs Joanne Quill will soon leave Northern Ireland to serve in the Diocese of Ibba, South Sudan. The vision of Ibba Diocese is to facilitate peace building and reconciliation, engage in evangelism and prayer, as well as promoting sustainable community development — a vision which the Quills share. Using their skills in pastoral ministry and counselling, Joanne and Andrew will support CMSI's partners in Ibba Diocese as God's kingdom work continues in South Sudan.

We very much look forward to Andrew and Joanne telling us more of their work to come during morning services on Sunday 18th February. After the service a Stew Lunch will take place in The Crozier Hall which we very much hope that you will join us for. Sign Up Sheets shall be found in the Church Porch up until Sunday 11th February and funds received after costs will be donated to CMSI.

With SAMS Ireland, we are also entering into a new Partnership with Dioceses in Chile which are involved in church planting projects. This is an exciting opportunity to support new churches in Chile.
