Rector's Letter

Dear Friends,

Were you born before or after 10th April 1998?

For those who were born sufficiently before that date 25 years ago, perhaps you will remember watching or listening to the news and learning that the Good Friday, or Belfast, Agreement had



been achieved. This was a very important moment for our country, which having been endorsed by referendums in Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland, led to the large scale disarmament of paramilitaries, local shared governance at Stormont, as well as other significant developments, some of which we could accept more readily than others. For those of you whose memories span less than the past 25 years, what life was like before is learned from what you have been told by older family member and during your history lessons. The atmosphere of life in our province during your childhood is thankfully very different to that of your parents.

Sadly, but perhaps unsurprisingly, the process has been imperfect. The pain of loss endures. The NI Assembly has lapsed on prolonged occasions including the present. Community tensions remain. Paramilitary activity hasn't been completely extinguished and this week the terrorist threat level for Northern Ireland has been raised. Let us pray for DCI Caldwell, for Police and Prison Officers, their families, and all for whom recent developments have been particularly concerning. Going backwards cannot be an option. As a country, we have moved forward, and we need to continue the journey. Let us also pray for our political process and that, if necessary, changes can be made to allow governance to succeed and many important issues can be addressed.

10th April 1998 coincided with Good Friday. Good Friday is a day when we commemorate part of the hinge moment of world history. What happened at Calvary has massive implications for all people. Charles Wesley's hymns often present theological points so beautifully and his hymn 'And can it be' puts the cross in the personal experience; 'Died he for me, who caused his pain; for me, who him to death pursued? Amazing love! how can it be that thou my God, shouldst die for me?' Of course the death of Jesus Christ would have offered incomplete hope without the resurrection. The outcome of the cross and empty tomb is the opportunity for peace with God present and eternal. Wesley could sing with confidence 'No condemnation now I dread' and 'bold I approach the eternal throne and claim the crown, through Christ my own.'

May we have peace in our land and peace within through faith in the risen King.


THE WELL

Curate's Corner

As I write my Curate's Corner for April 2023, many preparations are underway. Malcolm and I are both preparing sermons and services for the incoming Holy Week. A couple in our parish are preparing to get married this week, families are preparing activities for the Easter holidays and maybe you are super-organised and are preparing meals for the next week for your family. All of these preparation got me thinking about the preparation God does in us.

When we learn drive as part of the assessment we have to undertake a theory examination. This includes a driving simulation video where you have to identify any potential hazards to the driver on the road e.g. children walking close by, people pulling out of junctions, motorbikes and more. As well as that you must be able to recognise road signage and indeed the meaning of the traffic lights. I recently came



across a copy of the highway code in a bookcase and I was shocked myself thar I couldn't identify many of the road signs. As I was looking through the Highway Code I was reminded of the meaning of traffic lights. The red light means stop, orange means prepare to stop and the green means go.

With this lighting system we know when we have to legally stop, when we have to prepare to stop and when we must go. This got me thinking am aware of the signs when God tells me to stop, when he tells me to prepare to stop and when he tells me to go.

In times gone by Lent was seen as a preparation for those who were getting baptised on Easter Sunday. In time the Church came to recognise that all Christians might take to heart this season of devotion, pentiance and fasting in preparation for the commemoration of The Lord's passion and celebration of his resurrection.

In any aspect of life we usually have to undergo a time of preparation, whether it's preparing to start a new job, preparing for a new arrival or financial preparing for upcoming bills, the list of preparation we undertake in life is endless. In Old Testament Joseph underwent 13 years of intense training before being called to be the 'prime minister' of Egypt. Moses endured 40 years in the desert before he was ready to be Israel's deliverer. Dave Smith a pastor at Kingsgate community Church notes 'Jesus' disciples were fast tracked in three and a half years; the 40 days being the final stages in their preparation to become world changers'.

Emphasis on preparation comes out clearly in the first few verses of Acts:

In my former book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus began to do and to teach ² until the day he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles he had chosen. ³ After his suffering, he presented himself to them and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God -Acts 1:1-3

This highlights why Jesus stayed on earth for 40 days after his resurrection rather than ascending to the Father immediately. It was to complete the training programme, the preparation for the disciples. In many ways God's preparation of us through the Holy Spirit to make us more gloriously Christ-like is a work that is ongoing in every season of life.

You may be in a season of preparation, if so I encourage you to co-operate with the Holy Spirit and invite him to do the necessary work in you so that he can do all he wants to do through you.

As we approach Holy Week whether you're feeling prepared or not may we embrace what the Lord has for us this week, attune our ears to his call, his voice in this week of all weeks.

In what ways do you feel God at work in you right now? How are you co-operating with the Holy Spirit? If you feel you have been in preparation for a long time, take some time to read about how God worked in the life of Joseph. His story can be found in Genesis 37-50

Prayer:

Lord I thank you that you love me and want what is best for me. I make a choice today to embrace your preparation, knowing that you have good plans for me. Help me to learn to listen to your voice and respond to your promptings. Help me to grow in faith and patience so that I can inherit the fullness of your promises. *Amen*



HOLY COMMUNION UPDATE

Arising from the reopening of churches amidst the Covid pandemic, temporary provision was offered by the House of Bishops for the use of individual cups for Holy Communion services. Last spring, it was deemed to be safe to return to using the common cup, therefore the option of the sharing of the chalice was reintroduced, whilst permission to use individual cups remained. Since then, in St Mark's we have been offering communicants with the choice of the common chalice, or individual disposable plastic communion cups.

It was always the intention of the House of Bishops that one day, all parishes would return to the usage of the chalice exclusively. To that end, correspondence has recently been circulated to clergy stating that individual cups should not be used following Pentecost Sunday (June 4th).

At present we have enough little cups to be able to continue offering them until some point between Easter and Pentecost. Therefore it is my intention to offer the chalice only when our current stock of individual cups runs out. If communicants would feel more comfortable by receiving the bread only, that is perfectly acceptable. The Bishops' Communication stated that "... Those who remain for their own reasons nervous about receiving from the common cup should be respected, and they should receive in one kind only, with an assurance that the Church teaches that the sacrament can be fully received in one kind."

I hope that parishioners feel reassured concerning this matter. Should you have any queries or concerns, please feel free to contact Sarah or myself.


Safeguarding Trust Panel

HOMEGROUP

Journalist Sam Hails from broadcaster Premier Christian noted in a recent article that Hollywood can't be trusted to bring the Bible to screen. There was great anticipation and excitement when the trailer was released for Russell Crowe's 'Noah' in 2014, but sadly the movie didn't live up to the hype. Rather than staying faithful to the biblical text creative license was stretched to include... rock monsters.

When it comes to biblically interpreted movies and TV shows sadly it mostly provides frustration rather than accurate portrayal. However, Dallas Jenkins had a unique vision to produce a multi-season TV show that tells the story of Jesus through the eyes of those who met him in a way that is faithful to the Gospel accounts. *The Chosen* takes creative risks and is entertaining as well as being biblically faithful. Given most viewers already know where the story is going, the series is surprisingly gripping, focusing on how ordinary people – disciples, Romans, Pharisees – responded to Jesus, and the complex emotions that accompanied their meetings. Production values are high and so the TV series is funded by those who donate online to production, the character development is strong and there isn't a cheesy American accent in sight. Season 1 and 2 of *The Chosen* are available to watch free through the app or purchase on DVD (thechosen.tv).

Homegroup have committed to watching series 1 and following a devotional plan by Amanda Jenkins. The idea is that at home we watch an episode in our own time then when we gather together we read the passage that reflects that episode and deal with some questions together.
